Working in Open Source projects is not natural, Service Providers must be brave:


- No more client/supplier relationship
- No pre-sales manager answering kindly to your Xmas wish list
- Suspicious transparency
- Fuzzy roles, roadmaps

Even if we share the same technical background, we usually have drifted far from the code for the last 20 years...



Moreover...


- The documentation
 - sometimes does not exist
 - sometimes exists but is not correct
- English is mandatory
 - All English speaking natives will not always make extra efforts :)
- Nobody will do things freely for you...never
- Proxys will not be your friends...never
- Code first...even if you did no write a line of code since 20 years



Service providers must be active

Embracing Open Source as “spectator” is meaningless


- No influence on the roadmap
- Loss of technical relevancy
- Delay organization transformation
- From a vendor to an editor locked-in
- High risk of disillusionment



How to start?


- Register to mailing list (and create a filter in your inbox immediately)
- Have a look at
 - The Official web site
 - Wiki
 - The Bug Tracker
 - The Git repository
- Connect to IRC channels - there are web clients..
- Read Book
- Learn git/gerrit (usually good how to) and how to manage proxy accordingly

Get visible & get ready


- Sign the CLA and create a LF account
- Create your SSH key
- Select 1 or 2 projects based on their activity
- Privilege the projects to the groups/committees/subcommittees...



Start simple


- Clone your first repo
- Perform tutorial (in real..not just reading the how to or watching the video)
- Fix nits / documentations (there are always few) / test and give feedback
- Contribute.. (validate the contribution chain / git / gerrit/pull request / put contributors in review)
- Don't be offended if your patch is not processed immediately and even it is not merged
- Be benevolent



Do not speak (too much), do!

- You must be active – externally - if you want to have influence (TSC/Board influence is relatively limited...)
- Testing/reporting bugs
- Contributing code
- Reading/correcting the documentation
- Expose your code to the review – do not be shy – we learn a lot from our errors
- Open source contributors are not free subcontractors...never







Do not expect miracles and follow the rules...

- Open Source model is meritocratic by construction..at least in theory..
 - Over marketing is dangerous
 - Politics can be dangerous especially for big projects
- Open Source networking projects sometimes far from Free Software ethics
- Applying a usual management model on such model could lead to (internal and personal) frustration and disenchantment
 - “Poor quality”
 - “Not the features we expect”
 - “No view on the roadmap”
 - “where is the support?”
 - “Never « Telco Grade »”







What we do in Orange






